

Our Macmillan Coffee Morning

Thursday must have been baking day in Golant, because the array of cakes that greeted villagers when they entered the hall on Friday 26th, having climbed the wonderful, much safer steps with handrails on both sides, was a sight to behold.

The Macmillan Coffee Morning has become an annual event in Golant, supported by so many of you. Thank you to our expert cake bakers; the table was groaning with various sweet and savoury delights. Ella Page, our official Macmillan visitor in her splendid green tee shirt was struck by the enormity of the display. She enjoyed chatting to us villagers and discovering a little more about Golant and this event.

It has been interesting to delve into the origins of this Macmillan charity. In 1911, after the death of his father, Douglas Macmillan founded a charity called 'The Society for the Prevention and Relief of Cancer Mortality in the Uk'. He wanted advice and information to be provided to all people with cancer, homes for patients at low or no cost and voluntary nurses to attend the patients in their own homes.

After several name changes, in 2006 this charity became 'Macmillan Cancer Support'. It provides local information and support centres such as 'The Cove' in the grounds of the Royal Cornwall Hospital in Truro. These centres have support groups with cancer specialists. They offer practical, medical, financial, and emotional support. There is a wealth of information on its website. In the centres there is plenty of printed material in the form of well laid out booklets, each dealing with specific areas of cancer. A support telephone line provides emotional as well as practical support for those with cancer.

In 1991 The World's Biggest Coffee Morning was established with over £250,000 raised. 2024 saw a total of £239.7 million at the by now annual event. Sometime shortly after that year, Golant joined the fund-raising coffee morning. During Covid, villagers were permitted to hold smaller happenings in their homes which were well supported, and so we carry on!

According to Cancer Research U.K. in 2018, 49.8% of patients survived cancer for 10 years or more, many of those would have probably received some form of support from this wonderful charity.

The Children of Gaza

Every newborn child in this world is given a name. Wrapped up in that name is love. After the attack of Hamas the Israeli people grieved for their loved ones; for those who were killed and those who were captured and kept hostage. Their faces and names were everywhere. Of course! What happened was terrible. But what about the Palestinians? All those dead children? Why are they just numbers and why do they have to stay nameless? That is cruel!

Helena Nightingale managed to get thousands of names of children who died, either shot or killed by bombs. She began to write those names, with their age as well, on small strips of white cotton.

And she called on her friends, one of them Penny Parsons, who hosted several writing sessions. All we had to do was write, because Penny had already cut the strips of cotton from old sheets.

During several meetings in front of Truro Cathedral a group of people tied these strips to red cords, strung from tree to tree. Most of the people had a connection to Helena, some Golantians were motivated through Penny, and then some who were walking by and simply wanted to help.

Thousands of names of children, with their ages, written on cotton strips, were attached, one by one. We didn't even get halfway. Occasionally names were whispered. At times, especially when it seemed we were running out of space, the emotions were overwhelming.

It won't bring these kids back, and more are being killed every day. But it felt as if together we made a silent statement, which we may also have needed for ourselves. Because it is a helpless feeling when you care, but are simply not able to do anything to stop the wiping out of a people. A people who simply want to live in their own country, rather than to be allowed to live on a small strip of land with no rights whatsoever.

Vicar's Ponderings!

One of the joys of the heavy rain showers in September has been an abundance of rainbows to cheer our days. There is something so delightful about the arc of colours – sometimes vibrant, sometimes just a shimmer as though it is only my imagination – that I inevitably find myself smiling. One of the things especially pleasing about seeing a rainbow is knowing that no one else is seeing it quite like me because their position and angle will be different to mine. How special is that? An image that is unique to me – a gift for me alone to enjoy in that particular way. That is not to say it is not also a gift that cannot be enjoyed by countless others as well; it is just that others will see it differently.

During September and into the early part of October the sermon series at church has explored God's gift of creation as we begin to look toward our harvest thanksgiving services. The rainbow is one of the easy-to-spot creative delights in our world. We need to be looking upwards and outwards if we are to see it, so rainbow hunting gives us a great excuse to put our mobile phones to one side and take a moment to pause from the busyness of daily life and the constant clamour of news stories. We read in the letter of James in the New Testament that "Every good and perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of the heavenly lights, who does not change like shifting shadows". When each day seems to bring challenging and competing news stories that demand our attention, being gifted a moment of joy such as the rainbow offers can be a welcome relief. The daily news items can feel like shifting shadows that lead us to look only downwards and inwards causing us to miss so much of the creative splendour that is all around us; so, it is good to remember and recognise the stability of creation principles and order found in a rainbow. Of course, the sunshine and rain showers don't just lead to rainbows in the sky, they are essential for our farmers to produce all that we need to meet our daily food requirements and for that we are extremely thankful.

Our Harvest Festival celebrations will be held in church on Sunday 12th October at 9.30 am with the handbells and choir adding wonderful sound colour to our service. Do join us as we celebrate together.

BACKALONG

The following extract about our orchards is taken from the late John Jenkin's book 'A School with a View. A Short History of St. Sampson's School, Golant', regarding school closures, with information taken from the school log books.

"An interesting example of closures forced by local custom is given by the following entries in 1877 and 1878:-

19 October 1877. No children came. Parents kept them home to carry ferns.

The reference to carrying ferns is intriguing. Obviously it was something of great importance to the village, but why? No satisfactory explanation has been found, but since Golant was full of orchards and cider-making was a local industry, it is possible that ferns (or bracken) were used in that process, possibly to provide a soft bed for the storage of the apple crop."

Two Fruity BACKALONG Newspaper Articles

An extract from the Royal Cornwall Gazette, on 14th June, 1878:

SINGULAR STORM — A storm of an extraordinary character visited a part of Cornwall early on Sunday morning. At Golant, near Fowey, the storm was accompanied by heavy rain. Houses were unroofed, some of the slate stones being carried a distance of 500 yards. In one orchard twenty or thirty apple trees were blown down, in another fifteen, and several others have been more or less damaged.

Another extract from the Royal Cornwall Gazette, on 29th October 1886:

THE APPLE TREE

"The Apple Tree" was the subject of a most interesting and carefully prepared lecture delivered on Tuesday evening, in the Church Institute Rooms, Truro, by Mr T. Cragoe....

The Gilliflower was allowed on all hands to be a Cornish apple, indeed it was a child of the soft dripping climate of Cornwall, and would not do elsewhere. In the early years of the century Mr John Vivian was in the habit of sending regularly to George III a sample of the delicious Cornish Gilliflower (then a new apple), so that if Madam had her whim from Germany, the King had his pleasure from Cornwall, and the historic garden which furnished the royal basket was close at hand—nay! they were on the very same ground.

I couldn't resist this last extract, inferring possible royal connections for me!! Just a joke...


The competitors' ages ranged from the teens to octogenarians, and no pair lost every game, and most games were very close.

Back on the Green we held the raffle with prizes from local businesses including *Paddle Cornwall, Leyonne Farm, Colwith Farm Distillery, Tywardreath Butchers, Fisherman's Arms, Fowey Valley Cider* and of course the generous donations from villagers. The Lostwithiel Band then led the traditional Flora Dance along the front before *The Fisherman's* took over the entertainment with their BBQ and music from *The Stone River Band*.

Nature Notes

Be careful what you wish for should be the subtitle of these notes, after the last edition! Since then, finally, we have had rain, and rain, and rain...... all extremely welcome from our point of view. The ponds have filled, along with the water butts; I can slosh water about with abandon in the polytunnel, and every bucket and container is out to catch water. It has made us think seriously about water - again. Despite having approximately 7,000 litres of rainwater storage, not including ponds, it has been tight; I cannot justify 'clean' water to water my plants, nor fill a hot tub, as much as I

would love one! So I am looking to rig up even more water butts; I have 10 x 100 litre tubs that fill with rain water and then I can dip a watering can in, but they ran out, so I am thinking of filling water butts that are placed in the veg beds from the excess, and then things can be watered direct...not sure yet - a work in progress!

The warm, sunny and dry summer has meant that our apples have ripened, along with quinces and sloes much earlier than usual, so a mad few weeks of preserving and cooking is going on to make the most of the incredible harvest this year. The veg hasn't done so well, but more than enough to keep us going. Now that we have had rain, the beetroot, squash and leeks are plumping up, and the various leafy greens have bounced back.





Many people will have heard of the 'Chelsea Chop', but for those who haven't, it's referring to a few weeks in May (around the time of the Chelsea Flower Show) when some shrubs and flowering plants are given a 'chop' or hard prune, which results in more compact plants that survive winds and rain better, and gives more flowers, although smaller, which carry on flowering for a longer period. David has created the 'Golant Chop'...the hedgerow in front of the Sanctuary is kept reasonably low so that the view is maximised. Over the years, this has become full of Buddleia. It has had several 'chops' this year, with the result that there has been a profusion of blooms, smaller, and less damaged by the winds and awash in all sorts of butterflies and more hummingbird hawk moths (left) than I have ever seen, at a time when all the regular Buddleia has finished flowering. So please consult your favourite book, search engine or gardening celebrity before you take shears to plants - but when it works, it's brilliant for blossoms and wildlife!

The beautiful blue towering spires of the Echium plant are a fairly familiar plant in the more sheltered parts of Cornwall. They too are a complete bee magnet, and when they flower almost seem alive with so much buzzing going on! The tricky bit is the fact that they are biennial, so you have to get them through at least one winter if you want them to flower (some can be slower and flower in the third year). They can cope with a certain amount of cold, but hate wet, so a mulch of something and perhaps some fleece if it's really cold will give you the best chance of witnessing the incredible flowers the following year...

The one I had two years ago self-seeded everywhere, so I have potted up some seedlings that are doing very well. I have a few for sale if anyone is interested - you can contact me at: thesanctuarycornwall@gmail.com

1. Meetings:

Following our break in August, we are now back to our normal schedule of monthly meetings every 4th Tuesday of the month. This month we were consulted on the following Planning Applications, which we supported.

2. Fowey River Annual Canoe Race:

I am sure you will receive a Maurie Mail on this shortly, but please put a note in your diary for Sunday 12th October, when the above event is taking place. As most of you will remember from previous years, the club put in place a one-way system down Water Lane for the Sunday morning to enable the canoes to be delivered to the Village Green, and trailers are then being taken back and parked in Andrew's field. So please follow the one-way signs if you are moving around the village on that morning.

3. Highways and Water Lane Closure:

Just a reminder that on the Monday following the above event (i.e. Monday 13th October) work starts on repairing the collapsed bank on Water Lane. The work is scheduled to take a week but will not start until 9:00 in the morning and will finish around 4:00 in the afternoon, and Water Lane will be open in the evening. So please try and organise your week around these timings if you can. Obviously, the diversion route during the day will be Church Hill, which will inevitably bring its own complications.

4. Hedges fronting the Highway:

We have been asked by Parishioners to see if hedges that encroach onto the Highway can be cut back? We at the local level are not an *enforcing authority*, but it is well established that any householder with a garden or field that fronts onto the Highway has a duty and responsibility to keep hedges from encroaching onto the Highway. Please check your own hedge and ensure you are complying with the well-established rules that apply.

5. Projects:

As we start the process of considering our budgets and the resulting Precept for next year, we have been discussing the possibility of upgrading the toilet and kayak store and carrying out some 'ground works' in the village green parking area. We have an amount of money still in the 'kitty' from your generous donations to the Playground Project, and we wondered if any of that could be utilised to offset costs in the above-mentioned projects? Alternatively, we can leave the 'playground money' as a 'ring fenced' reserve, to pay for any repairs and/or renewals in the future? What do you think? Please let me or one of the other Councillors know, and indeed if you have any other ideas of how we might invest in the village?

On 18th September we had a fascinating tour of *Fowey Valley Cider* in Lostwithiel; from its humble beginnings at *Hybadore*, Golant, Barry has built a thriving business.

Barry and Sarah explained that they have a marvellous band of local apple suppliers who deliver apples to the works and get the end product in return as payment. The apples are hand selected to go into the 'scratter' that chops them up, and onto the crusher that sifts the juice from the waste and into the storage vessels. The waste is collected by farmers, so nothing goes to waste. They are currently experiencing a glut of apples, as many of you will no doubt have noticed on your own trees.

They make various ciders culminating in their Sparkling Vintage Cider. They also make chutneys and various oils, and Barry has now branched out into distilling gin, rum and whiskey.

You can buy their products at various local shops, and they also sell from the premises, and you get a locals' discount. 

M Cornish Maid's Recipe Corner





Mushroom Stroganoff

450g/1lb assorted Mushrooms, thickly sliced or halved—
(I used Chestnut & Button Mushrooms)
2 medium Onions, finely chopped
25g/1oz Butter
150ml/½ pint V egetable Stock
5ml/1tsp French Mustard
5ml/1tsp Tomato Purée
Juice of half a Lemon
150ml/¼ pint Sour Cream

- 1. Melt the butter in a large frying pan. Add both the mushrooms and onions and fry over a moderate heat for 10 minutes.
- 2. Stir in the tomato purée, mustard & vegetable stock, bring to the boil and simmer for 5 minutes.
- 3. Remove from the heat and stir in the lemon juice & sour cream.
- 4. Return to the heat but do not allow to boil.
- 5. When heated through, serve immediately.

Traditionally served with rice, but also delicious with jacket spuds or pasta, with a few greens for extra colour.

To make this even quicker on preparation time, you could use pre-packed sliced mushrooms ε onions.
