WOW!

At least three times more apples have been brought to our Lostwithiel Cidery by local people this year. So many apples delivered by so many people. If you brought <u>vour</u> spare apples to us ... thank you very much!

And what a deliciously fruitful year we are having! I thought 'mast' years only affected acorns and beech nuts, but apparently it can happen in orchards too. Mast years are nature's clever way of ensuring the growth of next generation trees. Producing fruits and nuts takes a lot of energy, so trees can't do it every year. Instead, they build up resources and release them all at once. The strategy is known as predator satiation. In normal years, squirrels, mice, and other seedeating animals consume most of the crop. But in a mast year, there's so much food that the animals can't possibly eat it all, so some seeds inevitably escape



and grow into new saplings. It happens about every five years, and the last one was in 2020.

And it's not just apples showing up in large numbers. When we saw the early sloes this year, we decided to make our very first Sloe Gin Liqueur in time for Christmas. Like Santa's Elves, we are working round the clock building up our stocks of Mulled Cider, Mulled Wine, Single Malt Cornish Whisky and our delicious cream liqueurs.

Come on over to the tasting room and have a sample of any or all of the above, Monday to Friday 10am till 4pm. Our address is:

With the season having been early this year and most apples already harvested, Karen and Dave still managed to put on a super display of Sanctuary fruits, sharing their knowledge of apple varieties and different ways to preserve them, including a selection of bottled apples opened for us to taste.

Liz Barclay's display of the story behind Sheila's Orchard at *Wringford* also included a selection of labelled apple varieties. This is a well established and carefully managed orchard, and incredibly, Liz, with the help of Carol and Alice Gabb, harvested an incredible **7,298kg** to take to *Fowey Valley Cider* as part of their apple swapping scheme. A number of other Golantians also took advantage of this scheme and so there should be much merriment this festive season!

It was therefore lovely that Barrie Gibson (below, left) supported our apple day with a Fowey Valley Cider stall. Along with his wife Geraldine, he first established a small cidery at *Hybadore*, Golant in 2012 before moving to their current premises in Lostwithiel in 2020. (See page 2 for Barrie's article)

"My parents Peter and Reay Fuller bought Waters Edge in July 1978. The house looked rather different then - there were wrought iron screens on the windows facing the street and high Leylandii hedges along the river side and behind the garage. The previous owner was a man called Corry Wright, and his wife's first names from our deeds were Marina Hildegund. My parents always told us that the screening was because Corry had been a witness at the Nuremberg trials and wanted to maintain his privacy. We have done a quick search of the list of witnesses from the trial that are on the web but have not seen his name. Was he really anxious about being found, was this true at all? The film Nuremberg has made us wonder again. Any thoughts gratefully received."

Remembrance Sunday is always at the mercy of the weather, but the worst of the rain held off during the Act of Remembrance at the Village War Memorial. The Reverend James Funnell again presided, and the handbells played The Last Post and The Rouse to mark the start and end of the two minutes' silence. Despite the forecast, many villagers came to support, and many stayed for the service of Holy Communion that followed. A highlight of the service was undoubtedly the choir anthem, Sunset and Evening Star by Parry.

Several of the congregation then went to *The Fisherman's Arms* for lunch, and many thanks to Nick for making a donation to the Poppy Appeal for every Remembrance Sunday lunch served, and also for making a similar donation from the previous Friday's fish and chip menu.

Christmas highlights are as follows:

Sunday 14th December: 4.30pm: A Cornish Christmas:

A very varied set of readings about Christmas - including local poets, Cornish poets, and famous poets - carols on the handbells, and congregational carols - with a candle-lit church giving that Christmas feeling. There will be something for everyone at this service, including a glass or two of wine at the end!

<u>Wednesday 17th December</u>: 7.00pm: **Carols on the handbells** at *The Fisherman's Arms*, followed by the Christmas Raffle. Come and sing along or hum along to well-known carols, and enjoy our lovely pub - and see if you have won something in the raffle!

Christmas Eve: 6.30pm: A Festival of Lessons & Carols.

A fully candle-lit service, with the traditional Christmas Bible readings, and carols for both congregation and choir. Very few churches still offer this lovely service, first devised by Bishop Benson when he was Bishop of Truro. This is the best way to start Christmas, and there will be a glass or two of wine served afterwards.

On <u>Christmas Day</u> there is a family **Holy Communion** at 9.30am - all most welcome! Choir and crackers!

Sunday 28th: 10.00am Tregaminion Chapel of Ease. No service at St Sampson's, but the handbell ringers are playing for the Benefice Service at Tregaminion Chapel of Ease at 10.00am. This is a lovely old chapel, built for the workers on the Rashleigh Estate, and consecrated in 1816. Do come and join us.

Finally, on <u>January 1st, 2026</u>, there will be a chance to Ring in the New Year. Try your hand at the handbells or big bells - or both - and enjoy a glass of wine and some nibbles. All most welcome. 11.45am onwards.

NARROW ESCAPE FROM DROWNING NEAR

LOSTWITHIEL - On Monday afternoon a misfortune befell Mr. J. Thomas of Lostwithiel, as he was coming up the River Fowey with a heavily laden boat. By some means the craft capsized, and Thomas was thrown into the water. The man, unfortunately, was unable to swim, and after being in the water for some time, he was seen and rescued by some bargemen. He was taken to the public-house at Golant, where, under the treatment of two medical men, he soon recovered.

So not only was this <u>another</u> local **Rescue**, albeit 136 years ago, but also **The Fisherman's Arms**, (dating back to 1826), was a good recovery venue, as was our recent one (page...)!!

The following extract is taken <u>100 years</u> ago from the **Cornish Guardian**, on 14th December 1925

GOLANT.

Local Hero Rescues Elderly Man from Spring Tide Drama on the River Fowey

On what started as a typical Saturday evening in Golant, a group of locals were enjoying a relaxed drink on the pub terrace just chatting about life. Suddenly we heard a voice carrying over the water from the middle of the river. It was an elderly man shouting, "Row, row, why aren't you rowing," to whom we thought was a second person in the dinghy.

Initially, we all had a bit of a chuckle – typical village humour – why would anyone try to row against a strong spring tide, in the middle of the river? It then became clear that the man was alone and in real trouble as darkness started to descend.

That is when Dan Palmer, our very own local hero, sprang into action. Without a moment's hesitation, he changed into his canoeing gear and pulled his canoe off the top of his van. He was out on the water in minutes and reached the man shortly after. If you have seen Dan paddling at top speed, it is an impressive sight!

Dan is a member of Truro Canoe club, is a top competitor and coach and that day, coincidentally, had been on a lifesaving course. Dan reached the man and secured the dinghy with a tow rope. He then towed the dinghy and its occupant to a secure mooring back on the slipway.

In a time when we all need a bit of good news, Dan's actions remind us that there are still everyday heroes among us, ready to help at a moment's notice. A huge 'thank you' to Dan for his quick thinking and big heart! Oh, and I bought him a pint!

Golant Boatwatch held a very enjoyable Annual General Meeting on 14th November in the Village Hall, and was privileged to be addressed on behalf of Fowey RNLI by Steve Lloyd.

David gave a presentation covering the work of the RNLI in both rescue and water safety education, and also the reasoning behind the replacement of the Trent Lifeboat in Fowey by an Atlantic 85.

Russ Hall, BEM, represented the Police, and confirmed that marine crime in the area remains low. The Harbourmaster sent a report on Port activities as he could not attend, due to prior commitments at the Fowey Christmas Market.

The meeting was very well attended, with forty-four Boatwatch members there, together with the two speakers. We were all well refreshed by very fine pasties and suitable liquids.



David Parry has once again generously donated an original painting for us to raffle, this time of a Kittiwake. We started sales of tickets at the AGM, and the raffle will be drawn at the Spring Get Together Barbecue on Saturday 2nd May 2026. Do save the date for that event. We have received a thank-you for this, and a note saying that £805 manages to provide emotional support to EIGHT people living with cancer for around eight weeks through regular support sessions.

The grant we received from Cornwall Council's Community Capacity Fund has been spent wisely. The funders are happy with what we have achieved and are planning to visit to talk through the actions and have a look. The Community Capacity Fund is part of the Good Growth Programme, which is delivering the UK Shared Prosperity Fund in Cornwall and Isles of Scilly.

The Hall continues to be used frequently and looking forward into December; we have lots going on- Wreathmaking workshop, A Christmas Carol performed by David Mynne and Meet'n'Greet to name but a few.

This year the Village Hall decided to get involved and host a Christmas Mini Market at the same time as the Christmas Fayre. The Elves have been busy; we have a range of stocking filler gifts, decorations, fabulous toys, wreaths and Christmas Hyacinths for you to peruse while enjoying some festive refreshments. We have beautiful jewellery by LoveLight and original artwork by Cockney Studio that features many scenes you will be familiar with! Look out for the cards featuring village residences.

I am about to set the budget for 2026 and prices are rising. Thank you to everyone who physically helps us, to those that encourage us, to those who hire the hall and equipment and those who generously give us donations to keep the building open and looking good.

CFylm

As from November 1st, a sliding scale CFylm membership was introduced of £8, £10 or £12. The lower price will help fund the CFylm charity which brings film to rural communities, while the higher fee for those who can afford it will contribute to the overall service. The staff are always seeking grants to reduce the cost of DVDs.

Currently, CFylm are charged approximately £104 per licensed DVD, which we are able to book for a minimum of £35 or more if funding is unavailable. Three films set and filmed in Cornwall have been booked for October, November and December as part of BFIs Too much: Melodrama on film grant, which enabled accessing the films at a slightly reduced cost. *The Ballard of Wallis Island* has been booked for the 16th January to kick start the 2026 CFylm programme.

The walk proposed for 22nd November was the Rilla Mill to Plushabridge 4.5 miles circular route.

Unfortunately the weather forecast suggested there would be heavy rain for most of the morning, so only David Bonsall and myself decided to brave it. Well wrapped up in the much needed wet weather gear we set off through woods high above the River Lynher.



Nature Notes

The power of the press... In my last Nature Notes I mentioned that despite having 7,000 litres of rainwater storage, this last summer had nearly depleted the whole amount, and that I was thinking of getting some more water butts... Well, a very kind person emailed me to say they had two available and would I like them? Turns out they actually had 4 of differing sizes in their garage sitting idle, so we came to an arrangement and now they are all sitting collecting the 'generous' amounts of rain we've been having! Saved me money, and reused something, so every one is a winner, especially my vegetables!



I have finally finished the picking and preserving of the last fruits this year - this time, medlars. Thanks to Mike and Gillie for the extra from their tree; they were picked and 'bletted' -i.e they are placed in crates and left to get soft and brown - almost rotten, but not quite! This turns the hard, inedible fruit into an incredible soft, sweet and tender fruit - a flavour a little like a date with vanilla. I can see why they are not popular in the shops - after waiting for them to almost go off, they are then cooked and pushed through a sieve to get rid of the pips and any tough skin. I've made this into jelly, purée, chutney and a 'cheese' - a solid paste than you can cut and have with meats or cheese. (*Left*)

Another interesting discovery was fruit on our Autumn Olive - this is an eventually tall shrub/tree in the Eleagnus family (Eleagnus umbellata) and the tiny berries are beautifully speckled and very tart! I picked about 500g and they are steeping in gin, and I went back for the rest to make some sweet and sour sauce, but they had disappeared! So I don't know which animal enjoys them, but they certainly had a feast!

What a satisfying end to a record breaking harvest year! We still see loads of hawthorn berries and sloes hanging on the trees; possibly because we haven't seen the Fieldfares and Redwings that normally flock through the land, stripping it of every berry in a matter of days! Are they staying North as it has been so mild? Have they just bypassed this year? No idea, but we have never seen this amount of berries still left hanging...

The winter flowering blossoms are flourishing, and smelling incredble, especially a winter honeysuckle (Lonicera fragrantissima- a cutting from Gillie & Mike) and a Viburnum (bodnantense) - a 50p bargain from a garden centre, now six foot high! (*Right*)

We enjoyed a lovely day in the Village Hall back in October for Apple Day. We had very few apples left by then, as they had all been so early, but I had bottled 12 different varieties to see, although the flavour difference wasn't huge. I brought down some of my preserves - the most popular were the quince cheese and the tasting of the Chilean Guavas. It was wonderful to see the reaction as people picked up this somewhat insignificant looking berry and put it in their mouth - only to have a flavour bomb of strawberry and pineapple - not what you would expect! I have heard that they strike well from cuttings, so I will be encouraging many more plants next year!



Our volunteer wood group has started, and they have already chopped a large amount of fire- sized logs! Anyone who fancies a two hour workout in the fresh air is welcome - there is coffee and cake afterwards! Unfortunately we have had a large amount of Ash die back, so we are slowly dealing with that, although there are several Ash trees that are showing some resilience, so fingers crossed.

Penny has detailed elsewhere, (page 12), but we are looking forwards as always to Wassailing on 1st January - the beginning of the apple growing season - as always with cake and something to wash it down with - and we are nice and near (and downhill) to the pub for afterwards!

ST SAMPSON PARISH COUNCIL

Meetings:

Our meeting in November was the last official meeting for this year, unless we must call an extraordinary meeting to transact any formal business. But barring that possibility, our next meeting will be on the fourth Tuesday in January. We don't traditionally have a meeting in December.

Planning:

We considered one planning application this month: PA25/07689, which we supported.

Just Park:

Many of you will be familiar with the company called JUST PARK who can arrange parking with a phone call. We have recently moved the JUST PARK arrangement under our direct control and we would encourage residents and their visitors to add the JUST PARK APP onto their phone for ease of use in the future.

Parking prices and permits:

Following a thorough review of our pricing strategy and by comparison with many neighbouring car parks, we have made the decision to maintain prices in the P.A.Y.G. car park and for PERMITS as they are for this coming season. But you must still apply for your NEW Parking Permit in the normal manner, by going onto the Parish Council web site (www.stsampsonparishcouncil.gov.uk/) and looking under DOCUMENTS/OTHER. Vehicles not displaying a permit or a ticket from the machine (or via JUST PARK) are liable for charges being imposed by Alliance Parking.

Budgets and the PRECEPT:

The most important AGENDA item this month was the preparation of the budget for the forthcoming year. Each Councillor provided their thoughts and financial calculations to be fed into the mix of numbers, which were then put together by our Parish Clerk.

We have decided to make good our intention to upgrade the toilet facility, and below this report you will note that the toilet will be closed for a while at the end of January while we carry out the work. This, together with projects to tidy up the village green parking area and the outside of the kayak store, will mean that we dip into our reserves. So, to protect our existing 'ring fenced' reserve (playground) and to begin a process of rebuilding our general reserves for future asset replacement, we have been obliged to increase the PRECEPT. This might mean a higher percentage increase in your individual local Parish tax, but it will remain one of the lowest in Cornwall.

May I take this opportunity to wish everyone a very Merry Christmas and a Happy and dare I say Prosperous New Year.





A Cornish Maid's Recipe Corner



Tahini Turkey with Persian Rice

This flavoursome recipe is perfect for using up your leftovers on Boxing Day. Serves 4.

225g/80z Basmati Rice, rinsed
3 thsp Rapeseed Oil
2 Onions, peeled and thinly sliced
350-400g/12-140z cooked Turkey, shredded
2 Garlic Cloves, peeled and crushed (optional)
150g Greek-style Yogurt (150g pot)
2 thsp Tahini Paste
25g/10z Pistachios, roughly chopped
125g/4½ oz Pomegranate Seeds
15g/½ oz Chopped fresh Mint
Lemon wedges to serve (optional)
Spring Onions, thinly sliced diagonally to serve (optional)

- 1. Add rice to a large pan of salted boiling water. Simmer for 8 minutes, then drain, rinse with cold water and set aside.
- 2. Place pan over a medium heat, add 2 tablespoons of oil and onions. Season. Cook, stirring occasionally, for 8 minutes until softened and golden.
- 3. Stir in rice, cover tightly and cook over a low heat for 8-10 minutes.
- 4. Heat remaining oil in a wok or large frying pan until hot, add turkey and garlic, if using, and fry until crispy.
- 5. Meanwhile, mix yogurt and tahini in a bowl & season.
- 6. Stir pistachios, pomegranate seeds and mint into rice.
- 7. Spoon onto plates. Arrange turkey on top with tahini yogurt.
- 8. Serve with lemon wedges & spring onions, if you like.

ow we'm at the start of a new year, and Christmas is long gone, so one of the first jobs is to get all the decorations down and packed away until needed again, and I reckon 'tis always a sad sight when they'm gone.

In years gone by in Cornwall, and when the holly was the usual tree to have in the house, once its job was done and before it was aived out, people used it to clean the chimney. This involved dropping a weighted rope down, having lashed the holly tree to it, and then hauling it down through the chimney. Of course, this was done when the fire was out and a brave bit of soot would come down. This would be repeated as many times as it was thought to be necessary, and all the soot would be taken outside into the garden and left in a heap to weather for about six months or so. This only applies to soot taken from wood fires and not from fires where coal has been burnt. Coal fires produce soot with various toxins left in it and 'tisn't advisable to put it on your garden. But any soot from burnt wood can be used quite happily around the edges of the beds to deter those blimmers the Slugs and Snails! It will also darken the soil and help to warm it up, and assist in retaining the heat overnight.
